




The Second Southern Labor History Conference

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Second Southern Labor History Conference will be held in the Urban Life Center of Georgia State University in downtown Atlanta (at the intersection of Decatur Street and Piedmont Avenue). Registration will begin at 10 am, Thursday, May 4, at the registration desk on the second floor of the Urban Life Center. The conference program will program will be complemented by labor films and exhibits. (A schedule begin at 1 pm and extend through Saturday morning, May 6. for the labor films will be available at registration.)
